Probably its best known activity is its search and rescue role, in which all member clubs combine to field a contingent of experienced walkers to assist Police when someone is lost in the bush. Excellent relationships exist between Police S&R and Federation S&R members, and this reflects the reliability and self-sufficiency exhibited by our members, especially off the track in thick bush and rugged terrain.

Another well-known Federation activity is the maintenance of walking tracks. Track clearing weekends, at which members of all clubs participate, are organised intermittently. There has been one already this year and others are programmed for October and November, all in the Bogong National Park. Details are on the Club noticeboard, and elsewhere in this issue of "The Mountaineer".

Less prominent Federation activities are those where it acts as a point of reference for Government agencies who seek the views of bushwalkers as a whole. This work, carried on behind the scenes as it were, is vital in attempting (& often succeeding) to maintain acceptable conditions for walking and walkers in the face of stiff competition from other users, and sometimes abusers, of the bush. Some of the more interesting activities that the Federation has been involved in the last three months are:

- The Forests Commission asked for our (ie. bushwalkers') perception of their fire management practices, ie. the construction of fire access tracks and use of controlled burning, amongst other things. We were given only four days to submit a written reply, but thanks to the input from an ex-MUMC member, this was achieved.
- The National Parks Service asked for our views on the proposed cutting of a bridle track, for use by Mittagundi, through Bogong Park. The views of several clubs were obtained (via a request in FVWC Council minutes) and a reply was formulated, generally against the proposal.
- The proposal by the Mt. Beauty Chamber of Commerce for a road up the West Kiewa valley to Hotham, together with associated ski resort development, could visually destroy a large slice of Bogong Park, particularly Feathertop. Several letters of protest were sent out to appropriate State Ministers & other bodies.
- Discussions were held with the National Parks Service on "user access to parks", and the requirements of bushwalkers for access and quiet overnight camping sites away from roads were spelt out.

ROCK CLIMBING IN THE BARKLY

Canceing? Sounded like fun, they told me it was fun, but I wasn't sure that I liked the sniggers when they talked about the high water level in August, and a passing reference to rock bashing passed straight over my head.

An absolute novice in all things canoeing, I walked around pretending to be useful while the 3 men tied on the boats, 3 single man kayaks, and a 2 man effort casually referred to as "the slug". Naively asking who was to travel in this, the unequivocal answer was that I was, and in the front. Steering the nose was, apparently, my business.

Still undaunted, even by the thought of setting up camp at 11.30pm, and stumbling around in pitch black, erecting tents and organising sleeping bags, we set off at around 7pm. Stopping for a quick lamburger in Traralgon, we pressed on, and met up with some White-horse members in Licola who gave us the great news. An unopened envelope left by the Secretary in his file at MUMC clubhouse for the following Menday contained the information that the Barkly River Race had been cancelled. Ah well, at least the Secretary suffered equally. He was one of the three male members of the party.

Rising bright and carly, the men at around 6.30am, and myself presenting bleary-eyed at 6.30, breakfast was enjoyed slowly, and a car trip up an incredibly slippery road ensued at around 11.00am. Well stocked with canoes, stock hats, paddles, spray covers, and, not to be forgotten, food, we arrived at the starting point, and I looked in dismay at the boulders littering the stream they laughinly called a river.

Press ganged now, I clamboured into a boat, was instructed into such minor details as sweeps and draws, shut my eyes, and we were off.

I can't describe the emotional swings between elation at a well-executed draw, and avoiding the rock doad ahead, the despair when we met up with a leg we had to climb around, and the incredible frustration of ending up suspended three fact cut of the water on a slanting rock face, having negotiated the washing machine not quite correctly.

The whole trip was just one excitement, frustration and gut panic after another. Thankfully, we didn't go over once.

Five hours later (the record: 1 hour, 5 mins), after virtually pushing the slug over the rocks for the last 3 miles, we finally reached camp. Quickly stripping out of wet gear, wonderfully warm, we sat around a fire, eating combinations of lasagne and Nasi goreng, laughing, talking, drinking, with an easy cameraderie which extended well into the early hours. Finally bidding each other a friendly, contentedly weary goodnight, we hit the sleeping bags, and slept like the proverbial dead. And so ended my initiation into a form of self-torture I'll willingly undergo again if and when oppertunity presents itself.

CANOEING

The canoeing section will be holding a Snowy River Bludge after the exams. This is the annual climax to the year's canoeing and extends over a week as soon after exams as possible.

The Snowy is paddled from the Vic-NSW border down to Buchan.
"The river offers one of the most spectacular canoe trips in Australia with its rugged gorges, excellent rapids, numerous flat sections with sandbars and beautiful scenery."*

During November the river is usually at a good canceing level and is warm. Yes, due to its many miles of flowing over sandbars warmed by the sun it is not nearly as cold as the name suggests. On previous trips the worst problems to the group going down have been, sunburn, flies, and no cold water to keep the tinnies cool. Those paddling have varied in standard from "which way do you sit" to "wasn't the Figtreugh on the Franklin good".

Some basic skills are needed to negotiate the flat sections and minor rapids (the raw beginners have been in 2 man boats during previous years). The large rapids are easily portaged, swum, or some of the more advanced paddlers will try their luck for a second time.

The actual date of the trip is decided by you, to fit in with exams and work commitments. It is a great way to relax after the exams and meet new people or to see a bit of Victoria's interesting country.
